



Dear Member of Parliament,

Seven years ago, Molly Russell died after being deluged with harmful content on Meta's Instagram. The book we're sending you today lays out, in graphic detail, the decisions made by Meta executives which allowed this and other tragedies to happen.

Whistleblower Sarah Wynn-Williams, formerly Meta's Director of Global Public Policy, has acted courageously by sharing her story. Her book sets out disturbing allegations about Meta's C-suite culture, practices and leadership. It shows how efforts to commission an independent audit into the harm caused by Meta's products were thwarted by executives more worried about an audit trail than fixing the problem they caused. The book details how Meta strong-armed democratically elected governments around the world to evade regulation.

I believe Sarah. The testimony of brave whistleblowers like Sarah Wynn-Williams, Arturo Bejar and Frances Haugen must be heeded as a critical warning about Meta's leadership. Tech oligarchs cannot operate unchecked, inflicting vast harm upon our children, communities and democracy in exchange for hollow promises of future investment in the form of data centres or AI.

Meta did not want you to read Sarah's book. Earlier this month, the company obtained a temporary injunction from a US arbitrator preventing her from doing any further promotion of the book. Nonetheless, publishers Macmillan went ahead with publication in the UK.

I'm sure you will find Sarah's book as disturbing as I did. We should not ignore the warnings she has risked so much to share.
